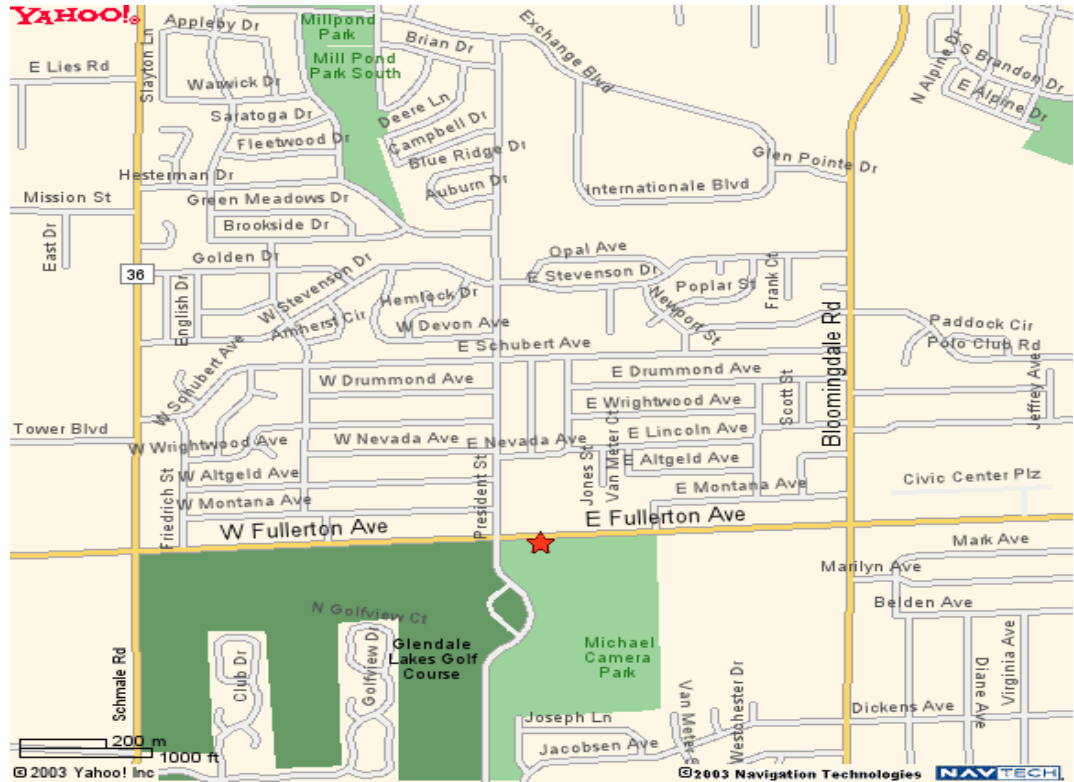

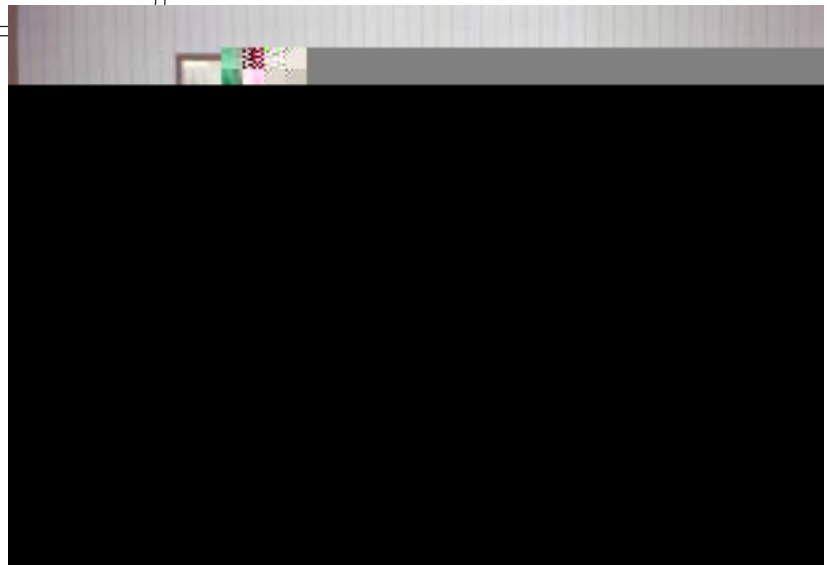

CAEUG's 20th Anniversary by Herb Mademann

Many of the newer members may not realize that CAEUG will be celebrating its 20th anniversary on January 26, 2004. This writer, so it seems, being the last of the charter members, thought it might be appropriate to review the history of the group and the reason it came into being.

It all began in the Fall of 1983 when I purchased an Epson QX-10 from Computerland, (remember that name?) for \$3,400.00 to enhance the efficiency of my insurance agency. It came with 64k of memory and two 360k floppy drives. One needs to remember that the selection among the many models available, including Apple, was a chore in itself. The computer language was C/PM. The operating system for the QX-10 was called 'Valdocs.' It was not possible for the computers to communicate with one another, neither were the software programs interchangeable. MS/DOS was not yet in sight, but soon to appear. The QX-10 appealed to me the most for reasons I cannot explain. Pretty soon I swam in a sea of utter confusion. Computerland put me in touch with a fellow who had also bought a QX-10. His name: Dick Erickson. It was he who made me aware of the about to be established Computer Users Group. Now enter Terry Batt, who was operating a computer store in Lombard specializing in Epson products only. He had so many requests for assistance with the QX-10's that he decided there was a need for said Computer Users Group. There was an initial meeting in December of 1983 at the Wheaton Library in the meeting room wall to wall packed with people, 200 is my guess. During this, what you might call an orientation, an attorney from Lake Forest voiced all sorts of legal objections as to why a group of this kind might be subject to litigation by the State of Illinois. In short order, he was in so many words invited to head for the door. Terry Batt was the host for this meeting. It was decided to schedule the first formal meeting on the fourth Saturday of the following month, that being January 26, 1984. And so it happened, again with a rather large audience. A slate of officers was put together. An election was held and Rich Cartwright was elected the first president. The official name of the group was: 'Chicago Area Epson Users Group' and for a

good reason. Epson supported the group with discounts and raffle items. Membership cards were printed. To participate in a raffle, it was mandatory to present your card. Membership dues were set at \$20.00 per family, same as it is today, except with an additional enrollment fee of \$5.00. Rich Cartwright was quite energetic in getting the group on its feet by putting together the by-laws, establishing committees and SIGS (Special Interest Groups). The size of the meeting room permitted to hold three seminars simultaneously, i.e. word processor, spreadsheet, and data base. Make no mistake, these meetings began to lift the fog for many who were present. The membership quickly rose to about 165 and the treasury showed a balance of \$3,500. Epson marketed a new model, the QX-16. It did not have the impact that was expected. Bill Gates put Microsoft on its feet in 1985 with the appearance of MS/DOS. Epson computers were re-configured with the so-called 'Titan Board' which allowed MS/DOS to run on the C/PM oriented machine. 300 baud modems also were put on the market and CAEUG soon had a BBS in operation of which John Spizzirri later became the sysop. As C/PM declined in popularity so did Epson's support of CAEUG. A motion was made in June of 1987 to re-name Chicago Area Epson Users Group with the intent of keeping the acronym as it was. The July 1987 newsletter shows 13 suggestions for consideration. Among the thirteen was one to name the group: 'Computer Assistance Exchange Users Group.' The change of name took effect in January of 1988 with the new name: 'Computers Are Easy Users Group.'

The remodeling of the Wheaton Library in February of 1991 made it necessary to find a new home for CAEUG. After much searching for a suitable meeting room, an interim location was found in the bank building of Glen Ellyn, free of charge mind you. Eventually, we came to an agreement with the Glen Ellyn Library, the old building on Park Blvd. for the use of their meeting room. The size of this room did not permit multiple seminars as did the room in Wheaton. Average attendance ran between 60 to 70. At one meeting in particular it was standing room only.

With the appearance of the internet, our BBS had outlived its usefulness. It was shut down in 1995.

The Lamp Post Number 48

Eweek Magazine's free-lance writer, Peter Galli, spilled the beans about Amazon.com's (<http://www.amazon.com>) Linux experience. Microsoft (MS <http://www.microsoft.com>), in their latest harangue about Linux ("Just the Facts" campaign at <http://www.microsoft.com/mscorp/facts/default.asp>), harps on the total cost of ownership (TCO). In the article, MS claims that Linux costs more in the long run. Galli restated Amazon's Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) filing, which says that Amazon.com has been using Linux since 2000 and cut its technology expenses by 25% or about 16 million dollars. That could be a fact that MS has not heard yet. The story is at <http://www.eweek.com/article2/0,4149,1465884,00.asp>.

You may have received an e-mail bounce (a bounce is an e-mail that you sent to an unknown e-mail address that is returned to you) after January 26th. It would have come from an address you did not send e-mail to. I have received about 50 of these thus far. I know other people who have received as many as 30 a day. Some of these bounces have attachments with .exe, .txt or .zip extensions. The .txt extension is actually a masked .scr extension. These attachments contained the worm known as W32/Novarg.A, W32/Shimg, W32/Mydoom, or W32/Mimail.R. The worm has picked up the moniker, MyDoom. It now has four variations (A, B, C, & D). The worm makes a zombie of the machine on which it is loaded. A zombie is code (a program) that executes at some later time without the knowledge of the machine's owner. The MyDoom.A, on a specific day, sent Web page requests to the SCO Web site (<http://www.sco.com/>). This type of attack is called a distributed denial of service (DDoS) attack. The attack was successful in bringing down the SCO server for a day. This was apparently the work of people upset with the SCO lawsuit against IBM for Linux copyright infringement. This cracker(s) should get a life. Bringing down any server is a criminal enterprise that should not be tolerated. SCO and Microsoft both offered a \$250,000 reward for information leading to a successful prosecution of the offenders. MS offered the reward because the MyDoom.B was set to attack MS. MS was able to protect itself from the attack. Information is at

If you downloaded and executed any of these attachments, your machine is a zombie. It must be cleaned of the worm. Symantec has a free tool to clean machines at <http://www.symantec.com/avcenter/venc/data/w32.mydoom@mm.removal.tool.html>. F-Secure's Web site also has a free disinfection tool for users who don't have antivirus packages (<http://www.f-secure.com/v-descs/novarg.shtml>). The worm only affects Windows 9x/Me/2000/2003/XP systems. The method used by the cracker(s) is to use a real e-mail address (yours) to send the e-mail to an address that does not exist. The bounce is returned to the real address in the hope that the recipient will execute the attached code. MyDoom.C and D are explained here; <http://www.theregister.co.uk/content/56/35450.html>

Voting on the Internet has been in the news on and off for the past year. The Diebold Company is proposing to supply software and hardware, but would not reveal the program internals so that everyone could know it was fair and unbiased. In that same vane, a report has come out about soldiers using the Internet to vote in their home elections while on station overseas. The Pentagon decided that on-line voting does NOT work "in view of the inability to ensure legitimacy of votes, thereby bringing into doubt the integrity of the election." A three-finger salute goes out to David Bradley. He was the IBM employee that invented the Ctrl-Alt-Del keystroke combination. He retired on January 30, 2004.

The Santa Cruz Operation (SCO <http://www.sco.com/>) amended its complaint against IBM (<http://www.ibm.com/us/>). SCO no longer contends that IBM misappropriated trade secrets. SCO upped the damage claim to \$5 billion on contract violations, copyright infringement, and unfair competition. In another twist, SCO is lobbying Congress about Linux, claiming that Linux should be banned because it threatens intellectual property and national security. I have a Belkin USB VideoBusII(tm). It allows the capture of audio and video from any S-video or RCA video output converting it to USB input for the computer. It comes with MGI VideoWave IISE and PhotoSuite IISE software. Both of these are older, lite editions of Roxio products. I have not tested the software with a DVD writer, yet. The video files that the software produces are un-optimized .avi files that are very large. I sampled a 90-second video that produced an .avi file that was 76 megabytes. The full Roxio product (<http://www.mgisoft.com/products/videoWave5/features.html>) may overcome that serious drawback, but it costs as much as the Belkin hardware; see http://catalog.belkin.com/IWCatProductPage.process?Merchant_Id=&Product_Id=88962 I am not sure if other products have better or worse results. If anyone has a video capture product, please submit your experience with it to Kathy Groce for publication in ARI...

Kathy Groce recently received a RipFlash(tm) DX MP3/WMA Player and WMA Recorder from Pogo Products (http://www.pogoproducts.com/ripflash_dx.html). It not only plays MP3s (optimized, near CD quality audio files) and WMAs (Windows Media Audio files) but also records WMAs. She recorded one of her CDs on her PC to WMAs using the Windows Media Player. She

tried to transfer the WMAs to the RipFlash player. The transfer program (it comes with the RipFlash) informed her that the files could not be transferred because they had DMR (digital rights management) and the player could not play them. Kathy has been denied use of products that she owns. Thank you Bill Gates!

eEye Digital Security (<http://www.eeye.com/html/>) found a serious security hole in Windows 2K/XP LAST SUMMER and notified MS. This week (the second week in February) MS came out with a security patch for that hole. You may recall that early last year eEye found other security holes in Windows products and announced them without telling MS before hand. eEye was castigated by MS and in the press for letting hackers know about holes before MS could patch them. This time they 'did the right thing' and MS lollygagged for a full seven months during which time ANY cracker could have found and used the hole to attack your computer. Members' Forum:

A question was asked about web based e-mail and scanning documents to send via web based e-mail such as Juno.

Has anyone noticed a reduction in spam? The FTC has an e-mail address to receive spam messages. There was discussion about what good that does. It was also noted that "unsubscribe" links generally don't work and usually serve to confirm a valid e-mail address in which even more spam is then received. Eudora v6.0 has a "junk rating" that ferrets out 90% of spam. It is still advisable to check the junk folder for e-mail that is not spam.

Ever hear of "Phishing"? This is a type of e-mail that supposedly comes from companies such as E-Bay, PayPal or Best Buy. They advise there is something wrong with your account and direct you to click on a link to enter in your credit card, checking account number and other personal information update your account or they will cancel your account. Even though the e-mail looks legitimate, the link actually redirects you to another web site. Thousands of people are fooled into giving up their personal information. This is what leads to identity theft. Legitimate companies will usually never ask for personal information in this manner. (Secretary's note: I have never had a PayPal or Best Buy account and I have received the above e-mails asking for this information.)
